Cognitive flexibility—generating alternative methods of solving a problem or reaching a goal. Self-monitoring—checking on one's own cognitions and actions to assure that they are in line with one's intentions. Goal Orientation—creating and carrying out a multi-step plan for achieving a goal in a timely fashion, keeping the "big picture" in mind.
