He finds supporting evidence for this view in the writings of Newman and in Henry James's *The Portrait of a Lady*, which he reads as a narrative structurally reversing Milton's representation of the fall of Eve in *Paradise Lost*. The author systematically analyses and reanalyses key passages in his texts in the light of the many arguments for and against free will, seeking thereby to affirm the validity in principle, and the personal and political importance in practice, of the Christian humanist tradition of which he sees Milton, Newman and the Pope as important (if sometimes misleading) spokesmen.
