the Q&A page at The Chicago
Manual of Style Online. Some
are arcane, some simply
hilarious—and one editor,
Carol Fisher Saller, reads
every single one of them. All
too often she notes a classic
author-editor standoff, wherein
both parties refuse to
compromise on the "rights" and
"wrongs" of prose styling: "This
author is giving me a fit." "I
wish that I could just DEMAND
the use of the serial comma at
all times." "My author wants

his preface to come at the end
of the book. This just seems
ridiculous to me. I mean, it's
not a post-face." In *The
Subversive Copy Editor*, Saller
casts aside this adversarial
view and suggests new
strategies for keeping the
peace. Emphasizing habits of
carefulness, transparency, and
flexibility, she shows copy
editors how to build an
environment of trust and
cooperation. One chapter takes
on the difficult author; another
speaks to writers themselves.
Throughout, the focus is on
serving the reader, even if it
means breaking "rules" along
the way. Saller's own foibles
and misadventures provide
ample material: "I mess up all
the time," she confesses. "It's
how I know things." Writers,
Saller acknowledges, are only
half the challenge, as copy
editors can also make trouble
for themselves. (Does any other
book have an index entry that
says "terrorists. See copy
editors"?) The book includes
helpful sections on e-mail
etiquette, work-flow
management, prioritizing, and

organizing computer files. One chapter even addresses the special concerns of freelance editors. Saller's emphasis on negotiation and flexibility will surprise many copy editors who have absorbed, along with the dos and don'ts of their stylebooks, an attitude that their way is the right way. In encouraging copy editors to banish their ignorance and disorganization, insecurities and compulsions, the Chicago Q&A presents itself as a kind of alter ego to the comparatively staid Manual of Style. In *The Subversive Copy Editor*, Saller continues her mission with audacity and good humor. From the #1 New York Times bestselling author of *Reviving Ophelia*, *Another Country*, and *The Shelter of Each Other* comes an inspirational book that shows how words can change the world. Words are the most powerful tools at our disposal. With them, writers have saved lives and taken them, brought justice and confounded it, started wars and ended them. Writers can change the way we think and

transform our definitions of right and wrong. *Writing to Change the World* is a beautiful paean to the transformative power of words. Encapsulating Mary Pipher's years as a writer and therapist, it features rousing commentary, personal anecdotes, memorable quotations, and stories of writers who have helped reshape society. It is a book that will shake up readers' beliefs, expand their minds, and possibly even inspire them to make their own mark on the world. From the author of *Little Broken Things*, a "race-to-the-finish family drama" (*People*) following a mother who must confront the dark summer that changed her life forever in order to reclaim the daughter she left behind. Juniper Baker had just graduated from high school and was deep in the throes of a summer romance when Cal and Beth Murphy, a childless couple who lived on a neighboring farm, were brutally murdered. When her younger brother became the prime suspect, June's world

time? Baart once again brilliantly weaves mystery into family drama in this expertly-crafted novel for fans of Lisa Jewell and Megan Miranda.

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
