audiences; finally, the study scrutinises the popular category of documentary theatre through various examples such as Robin Soan's *Talking to Terrorists* (2005), David Hare's *Stuff Happens* (2004), Edmund Burke's *Black Watch* (2007) and Dennis Kelly's pseudo-documentary play *Taking Care of Baby* (2007). It is specifically the value of the document that lends such performances their truth-value and consequently their authenticity. The study analyses how the success of these disparate categories of performance can be explained through a common concern

with notions of truth and authenticity. It argues that this hunger for authentic, unmediated experience is characteristic of a structure of feeling that has superseded postmodernism and that actively seeks to resignify artistic and cultural practices of the everyday.
