It seems to say that we all struggle with divided lives, engaging on earth in a shuttle diplomacy between limbo and heaven. treasures, she devoted her wealth to buying gifts for friends and strangers alike, to quietly pursuing her own work as an artist, and to guarding the privacy she valued above all else.
