Between the ages of twelve and nineteen, each young man makes many crucial decisions--often daily--that will set the direction for his adult years in mortality and even into the eternities. Indifference toward deaconal development places the church in a precarious state. By and large, congregations stand weakened by deacons who have not discovered the exciting possibilities of the office. If a pastor and congregation disregard the need to have trained deacons, the office is allowed to recede into one of mere honor rather than service established in Christ. On the other hand, if trained deacons or those in training discover exciting opportunities with which the office of deacon is filled. They come to perceive the office as one of service rather than honor. The church is strengthened exceedingly by their effective and efficient leadership under the guidance of the pastor. Unquestionable, God is looking for a special breed of deacons--a New Testament breed who are Spirit-filled and qualified. To say that deacons are qualified is to say also

Persons who have been ordained Deacons by the Bishop of [Name of Diocese] will be expected to remain in their Curacies two full years at least from the date of their Ordination. Certificate of Baptism, extracted from the Parish Register; or, if this cannot be produced, a declaration from the Candidate's father or mother, or, in case they should not be living, by some competent witness, to prove that the Candidate has completed his...
