Brazil and the United States Jun 12 2021 Although Brazil and the United States have long regarded each other sympathetically, relations between the two countries have been adversely affected by geographical distance, language barriers, and cultural indifference. With the exception of commerce, notably the coffee trade, there was relatively little contact between the countries during the nineteenth century. Nonetheless history reveals that these two giant nations of the Western Hemisphere share national interests that they realize are best served by maintaining a friendly, cooperative relationship.
