There is the early marriage with Anne Vane, his secret marriage, eighteenth-century Cambridge life, the intrigues of Grub Street, and, finally, insanity and confinement in an asylum. Smart remains a strange, enigmatic figure, repulsive or attractive according to the temperament of the investigator. His poetry is not easy to disentangle from his character – egocentric, given to exhibitionism, childish, oscillating between the extremes of self-belittlement and self-glorification; but he has his own claim to fame. Few other poets match him in directness of expression. He is a poet with the eye of a painter, developed in an unusually high degree. He has a stereoscopic vision which makes the object leap to the eye, the painter's sense of physical texture and his skill in composing a picture. Then again, there

is his versatility. He practised almost every kind of poetry and gave to each kind his own personal inflection. It is the aim of this edition to present as complete a text as possible in the way that Smart himself would have seen it and, in giving some account of the poet's life, to link his poetry with it. The book will be of interest to students of eighteenth-century literature and history.

Each section of this anthology begins with an epigraph. The darker sections of this anthology are about my grandmothers. From childhood my mother began telling me about their travails. She told me their stories repeatedly because she wanted me to write about them so they would never be forgotten. The remarkable thing about the lives of these women was the fatalism with which they accepted the injustices done to them. They both suffered from asthma. My paternal grandfather traded in his wife for her younger sister because in his ignorance he believed that asthma was contagious. He took the second sister off to a distant island. My father and his mother were sent to live with her

eldest brother. Three times daily my father went with his calabash to collect their meals from relatives. When my grandmother died my grandfather returned home and took my father. By then he had two more sons. Throughout his life my father lashed out at his aunt who was twelve years old when she was made to take her sisters place. The trauma of witnessing his mothers pain drove my father to drink himself into an early grave. When my grandmother gave birth to my mother rabies hit her father-in-laws herd and killed more than fifty cattle. Her mother-in-law attributed this disaster to the daughter-in-law and her female newborn. She claimed that they were cursed. She forced her son to take his wife back to her family. They sailed overnight down the Demerara River to Georgetown on an open raft. My grandmother contracted pneumonia and had an intense battle with death. She recovered to the news that her husband had remarried. He never learned that she became asthmatic. My grandmothers went to early graves. My mother lives with their

heartache and she passed this legacy to me. The fruits my grandmothers reaped from this world were bitter but the pathos of their lives has mellowed into a sad beauty as the decades passed. May the poetry of their anguish bring you pleasure and a better understanding of the female condition.

1801 to Harrow. In 1805 he went up to Trinity College, Cambridge, later gaining a reputation in London for his startling good looks and extravagant behaviour. His first collection of poems, *Hours of Idleness* (1807), was not well received, but with the publication of the first two cantos of *Childe Harold's Pilgrimage* (1812) he became famous overnight and increased this fame with a series of wildly popular 'Eastern Tales'. In 1815 he married the heiress Annabella Milbanke, but they were separated after a year. Byron shocked society by the rumoured relationship with his half-sister, Augusta, and in 1816 he left England for ever. He eventually settled in Italy, where he lived for some time with Teresa, Contessa Guiccioli. He supported Italian revolutionary movements and in 1823 he left for Greece to fight in its struggle for independence, but he contracted a fever and died at Missolonghi in 1824." "Byron's contemporary popularity was based first on *Childe Harold* and the 'Tales', and then on *Don Juan* (1819-24), his most
